At her ordination, we heard how the hand of God is stretched out to us, and in turn we stretch ours out to God and to others. So we've themed this resource around the different postures our hands take as we pray for others. We pray this is a precious and fruitful time of prayer for you.

Using your handbook

Step 1: Identifying your 5

Before we begin our 10 days of prayer, you can start asking God now who are the 5 people you are going to pray for. You are of course welcome to pray for more than 5! They might be people who don't yet know Jesus, or perhaps people who are struggling in their faith. Spend time listening to God. To help you identify your people, you might like to ask yourself:

- Who are the people who are friendly and curious about how I live my faith?
- Who are the people who just keep popping into my head?
- Have I had any surprise encounters with people recently?
- Who in my family could I pray for?

Step 2: Identify who to do this prayer journey with

You might do this prayer journey alone, and that's OK, but there's something about praying with and alongside others. Consider gathering with others to do this time of prayer with. This might be your family, household, some friends, or maybe your small group. There are activities to do if you have smaller people in your life - we can all pray for 5.

You don't need to share your names with others if that's not appropriate. But as we pray alongside each other we are encouraged, and can celebrate when we see the power of God at work.

Step 3: Pray!

Each day you'll find an introduction, scripture, activities, and a shared intercessory prayer. Read on, and get to it!

Day 1. Whakawhetai: raising our hands in celebration

Pray that God brings to mind the qualities that God loves about your five people. Write these below. Can you share these with your five as an encouragement?	I thank my God every time I remember you. 

Yesterday we prayed for the flourishing of the work that our 5 people do. Today, Sunday we pray for them as they lay their hands down; for their rhythms of rest and re-creation in body, mind and spirit.

Pray that they might be able to have the space to do the things that refresh them today - whether that be connection with others, nature, hobbies and interests, exercise. Pray also that they grow in understanding that rest is a gift from their loving Creator and an invitation for deeper relationship.

Almighty King, will you guide our 5 people to embrace the sacred balance of rest and labour, recognising that in rest, we honour your design for us. Grant them precious moments of stillness where they can release the burdens that weigh upon them. We plead that ______ be unburdened from the weight of physical, mental, and spiritual struggles, walking uplifted in the light of your joy. May all of our hands be open to receive the Sabbath's gift, and may our spirits find rejuvenation in your boundless grace. May we all discover sanctuary beneath your sheltering wings and know the splendour of your holiness. Amen.

for smaller hands...

Do you have a set of scales at home? Choose 5 heavy things and put them on the scales. You might like to choose things that start with the same letter of the alphabet as your 5 people. Take those things off the scales, one by one, and pray for each person as you do that God might lift of the things they find heavy in their lives.



Day 5. Amohia Hands in submission

Find 5 small stones or other small objects to represent your 5 people. Carry them with you for the rest of Thy Kingdom Come, praying that your people will begin to allow themselves to be carried by the Good Shepherd.

pick me up!

As small children we raise our hands to be picked up. We understand our need for our caregivers, even if sometimes they fall short. But we have a loving Father who never falls short; who pursues us relentlessly. But asking God to pick us up is a choice we make which puts body to our understanding that we need God and cannot do it on our own.

Pray today that your five people would grow in their understanding of their need for God, the parts of their lives where they place themselves above God, and would begin to reach out to their Creator.

for smaller hands...

Ask your parent or caregiver to set up this prayer activity for you! Get them to hide 5 small things (like lego pieces), representing your 5 people, in a box of flour or sand.

Now use a spoon to carefully find your 5 people! When you find each one, pray that they will know that Jesus is their shepherd who knows them by name.



Day 6. Raruraru Hands in conflict

Carrying on the theme of writing from today's scripture, listen to 'Tuhia' from Link Church (available on music platforms or YouTube). As you listen, pray that love will be written over the conflicts which exist in the lives of your 5.

Do you have chalk at home? If it's OK with your caregivers, why not write the names of each of your 5 people on the ground outside, along with "peace be with you", or perhaps draw 5 doves, representing peace. If you don't have chalk, what other natural material could you use - maybe mud. like Jesus?

Day 8. Āwhina mai Hands which ask for help

Simply light a candle today for each of your 5 as you hold then before God. Pray that whatever they find hard is brought into the light of God's presence.

Grant ______ the courage to seek assistance when necessary and the humility to accept it graciously. Help us to remain attentive not only to our own needs but also to the struggles of others, so that through compassionate action, we may support each other in times of difficulty. Let us be beacons of Your love in the world, continually extending our hands to You in faith. Amen.

let there be light

Yesterday we prayed for the relationships of care towards others that our 5 people have. Today we pray for something which is often so hard for many of us: stretching out our hands to ask for help.

Pray today for the situations, known and unknown, in which your 5 might need particular assistance. Pray that they will know the truth that admitting vulnerability is not a sign of weakness, and that they will have the strength to reach out. And pray that when they do, they are met by the open hands of God and God's people.

for smaller hands...

Sometimes, people hold things in the dark inside them, things that they are worried or embarrassed about. But God sees, and loves them just the same. Today, grab yourself a big sheet or cloth. Get under it, and pray for your 5! Pray for them by name, and after each one, whoosh your sheet into the air, praying loudly: "let there be light!".

Day 9. Whakaora Hands which heal

Get in touch with at least one of your 5 today for a catch up. If they mention an illness, injury or other problem, offer to pray for that right then and there, in the name of Jesus.	[Jesus] asked him, "Do you want to get well?"Then Jesus said to him, "Get up! Pick up your mat and walk." 	Pray for boldness for ourselves to step out in faith to pray with them for healing, wholeness and transformation in the name of Jesus. May those we pray for respond in faith to Jesus' question: "do you want to be healed?"

for smaller hands...

Does one of your 5 people have an illness or injury? Today, why not put a plaster on the part of the body that they are affected by? Even if they might not have an injury, pop a plaster on anyway, because sometimes people carry wounds inside them. Every time today that you see the plaster or remember it's there, pray for that person to experience healing.



Day 10. Whakawahi Hands of anointing and blessing

You might like to pray today with water or oil; symbols of new life and anointing. As you pray for each person, pour water or oil from a jug into another glass. As the glass fills, pray that your 5 will experience Jesus, the living water, and be anointed in the power of the Holy Spirit.

Gracious God, in this sacred moment of prayer, we invite your abundant blessing and anointing over our 5 people. May your hands, filled with love and mercy, tenderly rest upon them, anointing them with the oil of your Spirit. Grant them a profound sense of spiritual wholeness and help them to entrust their lives into your loving care. As we continue to pray for them, will you bless and anoint our hands, O God, that they may be empowered with strength and purpose to serve you faithfully. Amen.

Come, Holy Spirit

In our tradition, when we are baptised, as well as receiving baptism by water we often receive the oil of anointing. Those whose hands that bless us with oil say: "We sign you with the cross, the sign of Christ / Ka tohia koe ki te rīpeka a te Karaiti."

Over the last 9 days we have prayed in all sorts of ways over the 5 people we have felt particularly called to hold before God. On our last day of Thy Kingdom Come, we sum up all our prayers, praying that in the name of Jesus our people would take the next steps in their faith journey.

Whether this looks like a journey towards commitment to Jesus in baptism, or just a next step towards an understanding of Jesus and their identity as beloved children of God, over each person we pray 'Come, Holy Spirit'.

for smaller hands...

Pray at the sink! Write each person's name on your hands in felt tip (or something that washes off easily).

As you wash your hands, pray that each person will come to know Jesus, who calls himself the 'living water'.



Day....forever? What comes next?

Our prayers for our 5 people don't stop just because we've reached the end of Thy Kingdom Come for this year! Here's some ways we can keep praying for, and encouraging, our 5 people, and each other as we pray.

keep your people visible to you

How do you usually pray or keep track of your prayers? Maybe a journal, or inside your Bible. Or where do you hang out a lot (in the car? In front of the mirror? Or the fridge?! Write your people's names or initials down in a prominent place that you see regularly, and pray every time you notice them. Another good idea is to tie a piece of string around your wrist, with 5 knots in it, each representing one of your people.

keep in touch with your people

It doesn't need to be weird. Chances are these are people you are already in relationship with. Check in with them regularly; find out what's going on in their lives. Invite them to things that you do. Ask them what you can pray for them for. Share what you think God might be saying to them (though if you're not confident in this you might want to test what you're hearing with other Christians you trust).

encourage each other and celebrate good news

When God answers prayer in the lives of those we are praying for, it's so good to share this with others who are also praying for 5. It helps encourage us and strengthens our faith. Even just hearing "I've been praying for one of my five and they got in touch and asked about my faith" is so encouraging. And those stories will happen! Just remember to share at an appropriate level so that you're not revealing names or personal details about people.
